My name is Robert Bibbiani, I am a lifelong resident of CT and father and grandfather from Chester. As a former state employee and parent/grandparent I emphasize the inclusive nature of our state and our country, the opportunities for expression and healthy disagreement, the diverse conversations that compose the sounds of our communities. Nowhere should the sense of inclusion and full participation be more present than at the ballot box. Yet, Connecticut continues to have archaic voting rules that inhibit safe

and timely voting for all eligible citizens. I voted by absentee ballot in 2020 because I wanted to reduce the #'s at the polling location, to protect myself and others. Many others made the same choice, yet lines were long in the cold at 6:30am on election day. The 2020 election proved that we can take steps towards safe and secure absentee ballot voting.

Many state residents work and are not able to take time off during the day to vote, and thus must contend with long lines before or after work, and as such, I suspect more than we would likely forego voting altogether, which is not healthy for an aspiring democracy. Allowing early and absentee voting will improve voter participation and ensure that the intentions of the electorate are more accurately recorded and represented.

Connecticut should not be behind most of the nation when it comes to voting laws. Voting is fundamental to our democracy, so improving opportunities for people to vote early and absentee makes our democracy stronger. It's time to take a step forward by supporting H.J. 48, H.J. 49, S.B. 901, and H.B. 6464 and begin to improve the inclusivity of one of our most important collective duties.
