

Proposed Budget Cuts to Connecticut Libraries

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Why are we considering cutting library funding and services especially during a global pandemic, which necessitates a quarantine?

Why would we want to cut free access to books and library resources while people are wrestling with some of our highest rates of unemployment?

Small towns have small libraries and CT has many small towns; why would we deny equal access to library materials for all CT residents?

The state of Connecticut's proposed cut of \$100,000 to "bottowitCT" dollars and the the proposed flat-funding the CT Library Consortium (CLC) would affect every CT town or city, and every CT library, and thus, every CT senior citizen, adult, adolescent and child. Building a budget by cutting "borrowitCT" and flat-funding CLC will be done by continuing to burden those who live in our state who can least afford these decrease in library services and materials.
