### **OFA Fiscal Note**

The bill makes various changes to public health-related statutes, one of which, provided in **Section 32**, is anticipated to result in a potential minimal revenue gain to the resources of the General Fund annually as it authorizes the Department of Public Health (DPH), starting 7/1/24, to impose civil penalties of up to \$25,000 on health care institutions that are noncompliant with statutory or regulatory requirements. The size of the potential revenue gain will vary each fiscal year dependent upon the extent that DPH issues penalties and collects associated revenue. Other provisions of the bill are not anticipated to result in a fiscal impact to the state or municipalities.

House "A" strikes the language of the underlying bill and its associated fiscal impact, replacing it with language that results in a potential minimal revenue gain to the resources of the General Fund, identified above.
